### We Need a Little Christmas

I don't know about you, but I am entering this Advent season with more anxiety than usual. It's not a mystery why. When I add up the personal, societal, and professional things I'm currently carrying, it's quite a load. I'm guessing that many of you all feel the same way.



In many ways the holiday season just makes things worse. Traveling, decorating, meal planning and preparation, and gift buying are all enjoyable in their own ways, but they also add to the load of responsibilities and expectations. How will we get it all done—and what happens if we don't?

Now, of course, we impose a lot of this anxiousness upon ourselves—at least I do. If we learned nothing from How The Grinch Stole Christmas, it's that Christmas comes whether we're ready for it or not. Life continues at its own pace and in its own time.

One definition of stress is resisting those things over which we have no control. There often is lot that we can let go of, if we're willing to. The Spirit of Christmas, I believe, is a call for us to remember what a great, wonderful, and holy thing God did for us in sending the Son Jesus Christ. There truly is Light that forever shines. There is Life that never ends. There is Joy like a fountain.

So, my friends, stop and listen. Hear the Spirit's call to let the Advent and Christmas seasons be times of remembering and celebrating the great Good Thing that God has done for us. Let us slow down a few steps from our hectic pace, look to the East for a guiding star, and bask in its glow.










### PRESBYTERIAN PRESCHOOL

- We opened the November 2024 meeting with prayer and short devotional reading.
- We met with WDBX-FM station manager Janice Paull who discussed rates and details of underwriting WDBX programming. After discussion, it was decided we will underwrite programs for \$150 per month for fourteen 30-second time slots per week. In addition to supporting local public media, we hope these messages will inform the community about our support of LGBTQIA+ folks, our passion for mission, and our progressive social voice.
- We discussed the 2025 budget and pledges received from the recent stewardship campaign.
  While giving remains generous and a few pledges are still pending, there is shortfall between
  expected giving and the initial expense budget. A small group including the church treasurer,
  Finance and Mission Elders, and myself agreed to meet to revise the budget before the December
  session meeting.
- The rest of the meeting was standard fare as we heard reports from ministry teams. We approved 2025 communion dates and set a congregational meeting for December 1, 2024 to vote on the slate of nominees for a Pastor Nominating Committee. —Kerry



During the early 1900s, Isaac Rapp's two sons were architects who had studied in Europe. They had been impressed with a church they had seen in Scotland and used it as a model for their plan. The stone was donated by Hugh Lauder who owned a quarry in Boskeydell. The stone was dressed at the quarry and hauled to the site and, under the supervision of John Hayden and J. J. Arnold, was put in place without the sound of a hammer.
