



CARBONDALE LAUNDRY **PROJECT**

Forty guests attended the February 2025 Free Laundry Day. The Rotary Club of Carbondale collected almost \$200 in Laundry Project donations at the Martin Luther King Day breakfast and made an additional \$100 donation from the club. The session



approved the Mission Ministry's request to use Change for a Change funds (coins in the Sunday offering plate) to support the Laundry Project, retroactively in 2024 and forward into 2025.



The Rotary Club of Carbondale awarded a \$1000 grant to the Diaper Bank of Southern Illinois, and First United Methodist Church in Carbondale collected diapers during February.

For the first (and second) Sundays in March 2025, the Mission Ministry is requesting donations for the following PRESBYTERIAN DISASTER ASSISTANCE (PDA) KITS. You're welcome to build an entire kit, or bring a few items and we'll fill in the rest.

EMERGENCY CLEANUP BUCKET

- One 5-gallon bucket with resealable lid. (If reused, please scrub clean. Do not use a bucket that has held chemicals of any kind. No screw lid. Brand labels are acceptable.)
- Five scouring pads (no stainless steel or pads with soap in them)
- One scrub brush (with or without handle) • Seven sponges, including one large
- 18 reusable, lightweight multipurpose cleaning towels (not paper towels)
- One 16-34 oz. bottle of liquid dish soap (antibacterial preferred)
- One 12-40 oz. bottle of liquid concentrate household cleaner that can be mixed with water (no spray bottles) • One 50-100 ft. clothesline (cotton or plastic)
- Five dust masks (N95 particulate respirator dust masks preferred; no surgical masks)
- Two pairs of heavy-duty, waterproof dishwashing gloves (latex-free preferred; durable for multiple-use)
- One pair of heavy-duty, reusable work gloves (such as Nitrile, cotton with leather palm, or all leather)
- 20-28 heavy duty or contractor-type 30-45 gallon trash bags (on a roll)

All cleaning items must be new; all liquid items must be capped and securely tightened. Place all items into the bucket, making sure they are packed securely to avoid damage during shipment.

HYGIENE KIT


- 1-gallon resealable plastic bag One washcloth
- Fingernail or toenail clipper (packaging removed)
- Bath-size bar of soap (in original packaging)
- Travel-size stick deodorant (3.4 oz. or less, non-aerosol)
- Travel-size lotion (3.4 oz. or less, fragrance-free, NEW only) Travel-size shampoo (3.4 oz. or less, NEW only)
- Travel-size toothpaste (3.4 oz. or less, expiration date of at least 1 year) • Toothbrush (in original packaging)
- Sturdy wide-tooth comb (remove from package; 6" minimum teeth; no pocket combs or picks)

All items need to fit inside a 1-gallon Ziploc-type bag. Remove excess air from the bag and seal.



It's time for our church to pay its per capita assessment which is sort of like a utility bill we pay in order to receive the benefits of those services. The per capita apportionment shares the cost of maintaining the Presbyterian community and system of governance which provides services and support to our church and region, and in the world. It is the necessary link connecting all Presbyterian Church (USA) congregations, enabling us to contribute equitably to the things that make us Presbyterian.



This year as we seek a new Called and Installed Pastor, we'll draw extensively on guidelines, advice and assistance from the PC(USA) and the Presbytery of Southeastern Illinois (PSEI). Per capita facilitates our access to these resources, which help us pursue the church's ministries and missions.

The 2025 per capita apportionment is \$40 per church member (the same as last year). \$10.84 is allocated to the PC(USA) General Assembly (church headquarters in Louisville, Kentucky); \$3.81 goes to the Synod of Lincoln Trails and \$25.35 goes to PSEI.

It is important that all of us, as we comfortably can, write a check for \$40 for each household church member (note *per capita* in the memo line). This way, our congregation can fulfill its obligations to the denomination and presbytery without having to redirect precious budget funds from our programs and missions. Thank you for your generous support.


