



#### **Living Our Thanksgiving**

When I was in college, Contemporary Christian music was just getting its start and I had a few favorite artists. I saw Amy Grant and Michael W. Smith in concert in Lexington, Kentucky, as well as Bryan Duncan in my hometown of Quincy. If you ever heard of the Second Chapter of Acts, so did I. During the 1980s, I probably acquired maybe 40 or so albums and cassettes of Contemporary Christian music.



My enjoyment of that style of worship and devotional music didn't really stick, with a couple of exceptions. One such exception is found in our *Glory to God* Hymnal: #701 "Sanctuary." Its language is simple and the tune is easy to sing. I especially like this lyric: "With thanksgiving, I'll be a living sanctuary for you."

Giving thanks and living thankfully may not always be the same thing. As you know, I'm a man of many, many words. Over my many years of ministry, I've written more than a thousand sermons, hundreds of newsletter articles and lesson plans, and dozens of plays. The number of letters, emails and text messages I have generated is astronomical!

At this particular time in my life, I am learning that *actions* speak loudest of all. I am thankful to be serving you all as your Covenant Pastor. A big reason why I'm thankful is that you generously support our church its missions. Stewardship Sunday is November 3, 2024. Your pledges and gifts will help ensure another year of mission-driven ministry here at First Presbyterian Church.

I also encourage you to embrace being thankful as a lifestyle. Jesus taught us that the good gifts that we receive from the hand of God are intended to be shared with our neighbors and even with strangers. The people and creatures of our world need connection...despite the many factions trying to divide, influence and even manipulate us. Getting to know others in your community --for example, by cooking for them, gathering resources for them, or helping them clean their clothes--that's living with thanksgiving.

I write this with myself in mind, as well as many of you. It's easy for us to go from the house to the office to the gym or store and back home again, and never really engage with the people who most need our help. I am (believe it or not) generally shy and can find it hard to get to know new people. But my life experience tells me that when I make the extra effort to connect with a neighbor I didn't know before, there will soon be an opportunity to put my thankfulness into action.

As we move through the election season (peacefully, let us pray) and into the holiday season, let us be inspired to make our faith even more real. Let us become living sanctuaries for our Lord God who loves us and blesses us mightily. --Kerry



#### Stewardship decision time is

here. We've had several weeks to think about our blessings, our grounding in faith and love, and our hope. Now it's time to focus on how much our community of faith needs and how much we can afford.

NEED: The tentative Expense
Budget for 2025 anticipates a 5.3%
increase in total spending. The
ministries have held the great
majority of line items constant from
2024 to 2025. However, the Facilities
ministry has increased some line
items over which we have limited
control—repair and replacement costs,
insurance premiums, and security
system costs. The Personnel ministry
has added the required increase in
our Board of Pensions contribution.

The Personnel ministry also has proposed salary increases for our Administrative Assistant and our Choir Director. If our pledges and other income do not cover the anticipated 5.3% increase, the Session will have to make tough decisions about what to cut and whether to draw money from reserves.

**AFFORD:** A pledge increase of this size is a tough ask for some. Others perhaps can do more. We simply hope that the blessings, grounding, and hope you feel will lead you to do the best you can.

### GREEN GUARDIANS

The **Green Guardians** invite you to exploring **carbon footprint calculators** to better understand your impact on the environment. Americans have a larger footprint than most world citizens because we live in a huge country in which we move around a lot for business and family gatherings. We enjoy affluence to travel widely and purchase many goods and services. Still, most of us want a way to help.

A good place to start is to figure out how our carbon footprint compares with the national average. Numerous carbon footprint calculators are available online; these are quick and easy to use but consider different variables which can yield quite different results. All calculators consider major contributors to greenhouse gas pollution by individuals and households—power sources to run our homes and transportation, and they indicate how one compares to the typical American (or the typical American in a single-family household). A good idea is to use several calculators and extrapolate the most accurate information from that combination.

The calculators below provide statistics and suggestions for changes to personal habits that can reduce your carbon footprint. Many offer carbon offset programs as well. Ann Warner has used all of these and would be happy to tell you about her personal experience.

Climatehero [https://carbon-calculator.climatehero.org/] Easy to read on screen, it considers electricity usage, transportation, and shopping habits. See if you are a Climate Friend or a Climate Hero.

**Carbonfootprintcalculator.com** This calculator makes it easy to determine an individual carbon footprint as opposed to a household one. It gets into some of the nitty gritty but doesn't figure in waste.

Environmental Protection Agency [https://www3.epa.gov/carbon-footprint-calculator/] This calculator indicates potential savings in dollars and in one's carbon footprint from specific selected actions on the consumer's part.

**CoolClimate Network [https://coolclimate.berkeley.edu/calculator]** This allows a simple calculation based on typical footprints for a certain size household and habits according to zip code; categories include travel, home, food, goods, and services. An advanced option produces more detailed analysis and results in a list of options for homeowners who want to reduce their impact on the environment and save money.





At the October 2024 meeting of the session, we discussed questions and viewpoints expressed in Joan Gray's 2014 book *Sailboat Church*, which I began reading as part of my fall continuing education time. The session discussed the wisdom of using media (traditional and social) to help the public better understand who we are and our missions in the community.



The minutes of the session meeting September 24, 1905 show that the use of our church for services two Sunday afternoons per month was granted to the Episcopal congregation whose members were invited to share in our services at any time.
